


# Learning in English



milestone. Please look forward to the next newsletter for a range of articles and photos from the Seikei Short Stay.








# All About The Learning Hub






Cowra High students helped celebrate National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day on Monday at Yalbillinga Boori Day Care Centre.

#### COWRA HIGH SCHOOL RUGBY 7's

Rugby 7's marked the rebirth of Rugby at Cowra High School.

On Friday 9th August 12 boys made their way to the Western Regions Secondary Schools Rugby 7's competition, some having played rugby, others league and some not, all keen to have a go. The boys quickly gelled, identifying that the ball was gold and they should keep it at all costs.



After watching the game before they headed on to the field, first match against

St. Johns College Dubbo. Through some slick passing by Tyson Williams and evasive footwork from Jacob Haeata, Jacob bagged two tries, followed by a barnstorming run by Isaac Petty the boys won the game 19-12.

The second game was against Parkes High School, changing the starting line-up Charlie Duclos and Eoghan Killick led from the front forcing their way through the Parkes defence. After forcing a turn over from solid defence by Connor Cole, Dan Britten and Myles Miller, smooth delivery from the ruck saw Charlie Duclos crashing over next to the posts. Aggressive rucking from Tom Seears, Beau Smith, Blake Sandry and Ben Smith placed Cowra on the front foot, and further sustained pressure saw tries by Jacob Haeata and Myles Miller sealing the game 19-0.

Their third game saw Cowra High take on James Sheehan from Orange. In a very tightly contested match the boys dug in and through some aggressive defence lead by Eoghan Killick, the opposition kicked and to their misfortune straight into the arms of Jacob Haeata, with some stylish footwork he passed the defence on our try line and set sail for the other end of the field, the afterburners kicked in and there was no one in reach, scoring under the posts. Following the kick off heavy defence by Cowra lead to a penalty on half way, the tap taken by Tyson Williams handed the ball to Isaac Petty, like a wrecking ball, opposition players were left in his wake and a phase after this had Tyson Williams backing up and scoring to the right of the posts. James Sheehan scored with Cowra victorious 14-7.

On to the Major Semi Final against Mudgee High. In a very physical and fast paced match Jacob Haeata made it to the line twice but unfortunately this was not enough, with the boys tiring and the cold weather taking its toll the stronger Mudgee team scored in the dying minutes of the second half to steal a 22-14 win.

Overall a very positive and successful outing for the 12 boys who participated in the competition; they represented Cowra High School in a very professional manner and should be very proud of their efforts on and off the field as we are. The outlook for Rugby has a promising future at Cowra High.


# **OP 10 TIPS FOR YEAR 10 HSC COUR**

- Choose HSC courses you're good at and interested in, and will lay a foundation for your future plans.
- If you are getting marks in the 70s do your best to get closer to 80 - it will make a big difference to your ATAR.
- Choose courses best suited to your ability. Don't choose courses just because of scaling or because you think they will give you a better ATAR.
- Remember that unis often increase your 08 selection rank in recognition of your performance in particular HSC courses (usually for Bands 4 and above).
- Make the link between your choice now and where you want to go after Year 12.
- If you're not sure what level maths and 09 English to take, choose the level that suits your ability and future plans. You will not necessarily get a higher ATAR just by studying a lower level course, and unis don't always increase your selection rank to reward your performance in the lower level courses, no matter how well you do. Also check prerequisites in case you need to get a
- Check if the uni you want to go to (and/or the course you want to do) has prerequisites and assumed knowledge - this booklet has all this info.
- To maximise your ATAR you have to make good choices about what to study, work to the best of your ability and work towards your goals for life after school.

certain performance band.

- If you want to get an ATAR, make sure you will be eligible.
- Depending on what you study, 06 marks around 70 in the HSC could lead to an ATAR in the 50s, while marks closer to 80 could lead to an ATAR of 80.00. This is because most students have marks between 70 and 80 so when you are ranked that group really spreads out.
