

A friendly reminder to all parents, carers and students that every school day is indeed compulsory, and attendance is mandatory. Any necessary appointments should be made outside of school hours unless this is unavoidable, and all absences need to be explained to the school clerical office as soon as possible. Please let the school know if you have any questions about this or require any further clarification.

### HEALTH HUB

The Health Hub is a vigorous and vital part of Cowra High School. It is a flexible teaching and learning, study and activity space that is often at the centre of all school programs. It is used as a meeting place and its main focus is the wellbeing of all students to ensure learning is maximised on a daily basis.

The Health Hub is accessible for students to use before school from 8:30am, lunchtimes (except Wednesdays) and until 3:15pm when school concludes.

### The Health Hub houses various services which include:

### Study Zone

The Health Hub is a flexible modern space where learning is encouraged and supported. There are timetabled senior lessons as well as areas available at lunchtime for independent learning.

### **Wellbeing Services**

Students are encouraged to make an appointment with our wellbeing personnel. We have a School Counsellor on site as well as regular visits from Youth Workers, Welfare and Wellbeing Liaison Staff, an Aboriginal Education Team and Re-engagement Officer, all here to support the health, learning and wellbeing of our students.

#### Library

The School Library is used as a resource and information centre as well as for personal reading and research, with books and computers available to students. Printing of school assignments can be undertaken in the Library at the reasonable cost of 5 cents per page for black and white print, or 10 cents per page for colour print. Text books are loaned out to students and should be returned via the library returns system. Books may be borrowed by all students and staff. The loan period is usually 3 weeks – this is extended for textbooks.

Reading, studying and the use of resources and wellbeing services are all highly encouraged in the Health Hub.

### MOBILE PHONE USE

As part of a review of the electronic devices policy at Cowra High School and in response to emerging research, Cowra High School has acknowledged the need for an update of its management of student mobile phone use. The purpose of this information is to provide students, parents, carers, staff and community members a simple process to reduce angst and confusion.

Cowra High School now has a "not seen, not heard" approach to mobile phones. This means that phones and/or ear pieces must be off and out of sight during all learning times. The aim of this approach to management is to empower students to make good choices in an autonomous fashion.

Current research informs us that when an individual has their phone on their person they can suffer the following:

- · Lower concentration
- · Increased fear of missing out
- · Reduced memory
- · Altered views of reality
- Increased stress and anxiety

Our school is committed to providing the very best possible educational opportunities for our students and as such, we are asking for parent and carer support to ensure our students do not have their mobile phone on during any learning time. All electronic devices are only to be used if explicit permission is given by the teacher in charge.

**NO warnings for mobile device misuse will be given to students.** The following process will occur if a student is unable to abide by the updated policy:

### **During all learning time**

### (including roll call, assemblies, meetings and study periods)

- · Mobile phone and/or ear piece NOT SEEN / NOT HEARD
- · Mobile phones may be used appropriately before school, after school, and during recess and lunch breaks.

### Mobile phone seen and/or heard

- · Blue slip or Head Teacher/Deputy Principal intervention
- · Phone handed in to the front administration office


### **Collection of phone**

· Mobile phone can only be collected from the front administration office by a parent or carer

### Repeated confiscation of phone

· Further discipline through Cowra High School discipline procedures

### **Administration of Prescribed Medication at School**

Administration of medication in schools is governed by the Student Health in NSW Public Schools Policy.

When a medical practitioner has prescribed medication that must be administered during the school day, parents/carers must:

- notify the school to initiate a written request for 'Student Health Condition Support'
- provide up to date information as required
- supply the prescribed medication and any 'consumables' necessary for its administration in a timely way.

Students must not carry prescribed medications unless there is a written agreement between the school and the student's parents/carers.







### TALES OF THE TOP GUN!

Scratch.

Block.

Middle bunch.

Limit.



This is the terminology of the Top Gun. Put down what you're doing. Tune in, learn the terms and nuances of the event we call - the Top Gun!!

The Top Gun is a handicap race. This is the most important thing to remember. The 7 fastest swimmers in both the Girls and Boys (regardless of age) qualify for their respective Top Gun event. It's short. Just 50 meters!

The slowest qualifiers of the top 7 get a head start over the others. It's then staggered back to the fastest swimmers, who are, of course, the last to leave. A well-timed Top Gun finishes with all competitors coming to the line together. The winner should be hard to pick till the dying milliseconds.


Because of the length, swimmers with similar qualifying times start together. If all qualifiers started individually, the first swimmer to leave would just be too hard to catch. No good, no fun!

Limit - These are the first swimmers to leave. It's named limit because there is no one else to qualify after them. Their times were just fast enough to slip them into the top 7. Everyone must catch them.

Middle bunch - Well they are in the middle. No more to say.

Block - This is the second last group to go. It's called block, because these swimmers are on the chopping block. They start just In-front of the fastest swimmers who are breathing down their necks. It's high steaks. Get caught - race over. It's hard to win from block, you must catch the swimmers in front, but not be caught yourself.

Scratch - This is the last group to leave. It's touch and go if they can reel everyone in. It's so on the edge, that if you put them any further back, you may as well scratch them from the race. You can also think of it like a scratchy, you scratch it, and you might win, but you might not. Odds in a short race are not in your favour. You're the fastest, and you are penalised for it. This is good, this is fun!









The Top Gun has been building in popularity and prestige over the past few years at Cowra High. Its big, it's exciting, it's all action.

When informed of qualifying for the race, several students play ignorant. Saying clever things like, "Top Gun, what is that?" It's almost always said in a loud voice, with eyes moving all over the place, just like a kid with a handful of lollies they stole that are now hidden behind their back. You saw them take them, they know you saw them take it, but they just don't want to admit it. "No, not me, I know nothing about the Top Gun."

You see, it's all about keeping your cool, pretending you are not too fussed about qualifying. "Oh yeah, I guess I could have a go." It's all mind games and tactics, you don't want any of your competitors knowing your desperate to race. If you play it down, pretend it's not important, then maybe you can fool a competitor into thinking you are not taking it seriously, maybe that is just the ticket you need to catch them off guard. To take a win.

50/50, that's how it went. 50% of qualifiers responded with something like, "Oh, what's the Top Gun? I've never heard about the Top Gun." The other 50%, let their excitement out of the bag early. It can sometimes be a slip of a tongue, or just another tactic. To come out confident, serious, and frighten the swimmers pretending they don't care.

It's all variants of smoke, mirrors and a little bit of your garden variety voodoo. Anything to find an edge. It's such an "unpopular" event, students who haven't been approached, come up in droves just to say, "thanks' for not putting me in the Top Gun sir." You can translate this quickly into Top Gun talk. It's something like "Are you sure I didn't make the Top Gun Sir?"

It's all very confusing for the layman, but you get the hang of it before too long. You get used to kids claiming they are cramping. These mystery cramps come out of nowhere, competitors can be slowly walking in 14-degree heat, having had 13 Gatorade's and a 5 magnesium blend Berroca tablets, then, next thing, they are grabbing their calf muscle and calling out, "cramp! Cramp!"

It's all rather dramatic. All part of the Top Gun! All just to throw others off. To make them think, "Oh, we don't have to worry about beating them now". ### Action Packed 2022

How excitement!!! After 2 years of virtual delivery being the only options for many career events, 2022 careers calendar is filling up fast with face to face, hands on opportunities for our students. Very keen to have our TRY A TRADE Cowra in August where we bring many local industries onto our school grounds for students to learn about the many career pathways available in that industry and especially locally.

Work experience opportunities are available in most industries now which is perfect for Year 10 students to explore the world of work. Students must complete an EOI (Expression of Interest form) which they can collect from the Careers room and a work experience certificate (located here <a href="https://myworkexperience.com.au/">https://myworkexperience.com.au/</a>) before they can engage in a placement.


Enid J Langfield Scholarship Zara Mckenzie
